When male freedom fighters were incarcerated, these unsung heroines took up the mantle, demonstrating unwavering spirit, courage, and resilience in the face of suffering and exploitation. Women played an active role

in a diverse range of nationalist activities, making significant contributions to the struggle for independence, both within the domestic sphere and beyond. Despite their instrumental role, the names and stories of these great women have been relegated to the shadows of history, leaving a significant void in the historical record.
