"Empowering Women to Counter Religious Radicalisation and Maintain Communal Harmony"

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Abstract

In recent months the world has seen a frightening rise in terror attacks. Most of these attacks have been 'lone wolf' ones, which require little resource, little technology, organizing and planning. That makes them more difficult to counter and prevent. Religious radicalization, including self-radicliastion plays a pivotal role in such attacks.

Radicalism cannot and should not be countered only with intelligence, police and military means. According to UNESCO: "It is not enough to counter violent extremism – we need to prevent it, and this calls for forms of 'soft power', to prevent a threat driven by distorted interpretations of culture, hatred, and ignorance. No one is born a violent extremist – they are made and fueled. Disarming the process of radicalization must begin with human rights and the rule of law, with dialogue across all boundary lines, by empowering all young women and men, and by starting as early as possible, on the benches of schools.

As half of the population in society, women have a pivotal role to play in countering religious radicalism. Women, of course, can and do play diverse roles in relation to violent extremism. Women, therefore, can play a powerful role in preventing religious radicalism. As home makers women shape the mental horizons of their children and are in the best position to spot signs of radicalization serve as preventers of violent extremism: They can render precious help to law enforcement and security officials. However, till recently the role of women in countering religious radicalization and in countering violent extremism was not given the attention it deserved. In India the gender dimensions of countering religious radicalization continues to receive scant attention. Yet, India has also seen its share of religious radicalization and violent extremism that it spawns.

The lecture and discussion aims to deliberate and understand the important role that women play and the potential women have to counter religious radicalization.
