China's growing influence in India's critical geostrategic space is raising concerns to New Delhi. Connecting the two regions would benefit both India and the CARs mainly in economic sphere. India can serve as a gateway for CARs to enter the South Asian and Southeast Asian markets. India's major disadvantage is its geographical isolation from the Central Asia. Geographical constraints have considerably hampered India's interests in Central Asia. Geographical disadvantage cannot be an excuse to neglect India's geostrategic space in the region in the modern technologically advanced and advanced means of communication world. A strong foothold in central Asia is also crucial for India's role in Afghanistan following U.S. withdrawal. The region also become crucial in the New Cold war politics where by predominantly there is rivalry between China and U.S. and in future this can pose various geostrategic and geopolitical challenges to India in the region and around. In such scenario, India's influence in the region will serve India's best interest. Central Asia is geopolitically and geo-strategically vital for India's extended foreign policy, and its operations will determine India's position in the "New Great Game" too. Indian should maintain a constructive approach to expand India's clout in the region. A successful India-Central Asia engagement will also advance India's national security interests. Close ties with CARs will promote Indian values and serve as a counterbalance to the rising influence of China and Pakistan.
