# South-South Cooperation: Relations between Latin America and Asia

#### **Overview**

The 21st century has witnessed several changes in the balance of power of the international system at the political and economic level, confronting diverse crises, mostly financial in nature. A unipolar world, dominant after the end of the Cold War, is giving way to multipolarity, mainly in the economic arena. In the first decade of the XXI<sup>st</sup> century, this new multipolarity saw the rise of several emerging economies and a wide variety of other international actors as well as a renaissance of South-South Cooperation (SSC). Nevertheless systemic constraints and economic and financial difficulties have led to "an impasse" in the present trend, showing that these processes are not so linear and that South-South Cooperation is under analysis in this second decade.

Hence the purpose of this seminar course is to analyze and discuss the evolution and results of South-South Cooperation in its second phase in the XXI<sup>st</sup> Century, taking into account its first steps in the 60's and 70's. The course will address the dynamics of South/South Cooperation and its revival in the first decade of the XXI<sup>st</sup> Century from a Latin American perspective, seeking to describe the regional context, the relations developed between the region's countries and the "Global South" in an attempt to unveil the pitfalls in the promotion of a more fruitful and mutually beneficial cooperation in the face of the challenges of a turbulent second decade.

We will be looking at South-South Cooperation strategies that emerged in the Foreign Policies of Latin American countries, and within this context, and from a Mercosur perspective, we will deal with the cooperation displayed from Latin America towards African and Asian countries, particularly in the case of India. Furthermore, and taking into consideration the present relations between Brazil and India in IBSA and BRICS, we propose to discuss the viability and sustainability of these links in a context dominated by economic constraints and financial restrictions either from the international or the domestic arena.

### **Objectives**

#### The primary objectives of the course are as follows:

- Examine various aspects of South-South Cooperation along its evolution and recent developments
- 2. Discuss the causes (structural or conjunctural) of its revival in the XXI<sup>st</sup> Century
- 3. Address South-South Cooperation from the Latin American perspective
- 4. Concentrate on Latin America- India international relations
- 5. Analyse Brazil- India cooperation within the IBSA and BRICS context
- 6. Evaluate South-South Cooperation in the face of possible systemic turbulences

**Professor Gladys Lechini** is an accredited professor of International Relations from the Faculty of Political Science and International Relations, National University of Rosario, Argentina. Prof. Lechini is a renowned Latin American Scholar with 10 books, more than 40 chapters and several articles to her credit.

She has a PhD in Sociology (Faculty of Philosophy, Literature and Human Sciences, University of São Paulo, 2003) and Masters in Social Sciences, with special mention on Political Science (Latin American Faculty of Social Sciences -FLACSO- 1995). She has a degree in Political Science (1974) and in International Relations (1975), Faculty of Political Science and International Relations, National University of Rosario –UNR-). She speaks English, French and Portuguese, besides Spanish. Presently she is Professor of International Relations at the National University of Rosario, Senior Research Fellow of the National Council for Scientific Research (CONICET), Director of the PhD Programme on International Relations, Faculty of Political Science and International Relations, UNR, Director of the Program on South-South Relations and Cooperation -PRECSUR (www.catedrarrii.com.ar) - and of the Rosario Institute of Studies of the Arab and Islamic World –IREMAI- (http://www.unr.edu.ar/rectorado), Coordinator of the African Department at the International Relations Institute, National University of La Plata.

She is also Visiting Professor at the Universidad Autónoma de Madrid, Spain; Universidade do Estado de Rio de Janeiro and Universidade de Brasilia, Brazil; Università degli Studi di Padova, Italy; Institut d'Etudes Politiques de Bordeaux, France; Universidad Nacional de Córdoba, Universidad Nacional de Santiago del Estero and Catholic University of Santa Fe, Argentina.

#### **Host Faculty**

Sonya Surabhi Gupta is Professor of Latin American Studies and currently Director of the Centre for European and Latin American Studies in the Jamia Millia Islamia University, New Delhi. She did her MA in Spanish and later her Ph.D from the Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi, with a thesis on the poetry of the Spanish Republican exile in Latin America. She studied in the Universidad Complutense, Madrid and trained in Spanish language at the Escuela Oficial de Idiomas in Madrid on a Spanish Government scholarship. Her current interests centre on Translation Studies and Literary and Cultural Studies in the Latin American and Indian contexts. Prof. Gupta's publications include translation from Spanish to Hindi of several important works such as: Cien años de soledad [One Hundred Years of Solitude] of 1982 Nobel Prize Winner Gabriel García Márquez (Ekant Ke Sau Varsh, Rajkamal Prakashan: New Delhi, 2003); the translation of the 1989 Nobel Prize Winner Camilo José Cela's La familia de Pascual Duarte [The Family of Pascual Duarte] (Pascual Duarte ka Parivar, Rajkamal Prakashan: New Delhi, 1990) and also of La rebelión de las masas [Revolt of the Masses] of Spanish philosopher José Ortega y Gasset (Jansamuhon ka Vidroh, Rajkamal Prakashan, New Delhi, 1998). She has also published an anthology of stories by Indian women writers in Spanish titled Lihaf: Cuentos de mujeres de la India (Madrid: horas y Horas, 2001). Prof. Gupta has taught in several prestigious institutions like the University of Delhi, Jawaharlal Nehru University, The English and Foreign Languages University, Hyderabad and IIM Ahmadabad. Prof. Gupta has lectured extensively in universities and cultural institutions in India and abroad, particularly in Spain and Latin America.
