

- Manuscripts should be original, unpublished, and adhere to the referencing style and other instructions detailed below.
- All submissions undergo a double-blind peer review for scholarly rigor, clarity, and originality. We look forward to your scholarly contributions, which will enrich the discourse in international and area studies. Submit your proposal today and help shape the global conversation on contemporary international affairs.

SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

AIS-Journal of International and Area Studies is an annual peer-reviewed journal that publishes original theoretical and empirical research articles on contemporary international affairs. The journal takes an interdisciplinary and comparative perspective to global issues and international interactions, examining the political, strategic, economic, geopolitical, cultural, and environmental dimensions. It provides insights into developing trends in international studies and invites submissions from academic researchers, area experts, and policy analysts around the world. Submissions are welcome from a variety of theoretical perspectives and methodological techniques, with a focus on South Asia, Southeast Asia, Central Asia, West Asia, Africa, and other developing regions via conceptual frameworks, empirical analyses, and policy-oriented scholarship.

AIS-Journal of International and Area Studies publishes four types of scholarly contributions:

- **Research Articles** (6,000–8,000 words) present original research addressing relevant scholarly questions within international and area studies.
- Commentaries (3,000–4,000 words) provide concise, policy-oriented analyses on contemporary issues of international significance.
- **Review Articles** (2,000–3,000 words) critically evaluate multiple recently published books united by a common theme.
- **Book Reviews** (up to 1,500 words) offer critical assessments of a single, recently published work relevant to international and area studies.

AIS-Journal of International and Area Studies welcomes both solicited and unsolicited submissions. All manuscripts submitted to AIS-JIAS undergo a rigorous process of assessment. Submissions are initially evaluated by the journal's Editorial Board in terms of relevance, style, and scholarly qualities, with those that satisfy our minimum requirements are then sent forward to at least two external referees. The review process is conducted anonymously (double-blind peer review) and only the manuscripts that the referees recommend for publication are then published.

Manuscript submissions can be sent via E-mail to <u>ais@imi.ac.in</u>. Before submitting your manuscript, please make sure that:

- -You have included an **abstract** in the document,
- -You have filled the cover sheet (shared by the editors) and attached it in your e-mail,
- -Your manuscript conforms to the referencing style of *AIS-Journal of International and Area Studies* which follows the Chicago Manual Style (see below).

References may be cited in the text by the author and date of publication in parenthesis or by using numbers in brackets. Examples of acceptable forms of reference lists at the end of the chapter/article are given below.

BOOK

One author

Two or more authors

Acemoglu, Daron, and James A. Robinson. 2012. Why Nations Fail: The Origins of Power, Prosperity, and Poverty. New York: Random House.

For four or more authors, list all of the authors in the reference list; in the text, list only the first author, followed by *et al.* ("and others"):

(Acemoglu et al. 2017)

Editor, translator, or compiler instead of author

Ritzer, George, ed. 2012. *Encyclopedia of Globalization*. Oxford: Wiley-Blackwell. (Ritzer 2012, 325-26)

Editor, translator, or compiler in addition to author

Burchill, Scott. 2005. *Theories of International Relations*. Edited by Scott Burchill et al. New York: Palgrave

Chapter or other part of a book

Book published electronically

If a book is available in more than one format, cite the version you consulted. For books consulted online, list a URL; include an access date only if one is required by your publisher or discipline. If no fixed page numbers are available, you can include a section title or a chapter or other number.

JOURNAL ARTICLE

Article in a print journal

In the text, list the specific page numbers consulted, if any. In the reference list entry, list the page range for the whole article.

Article in an online journal

Include a DOI (Digital Object Identifier) if the journal lists one. A DOI is a permanent ID that, when appended to http://dx.doi.org/ in the address bar of an Internet browser, will lead to the source. If no DOI is available, list a URL. Include an access date only if one is required by your publisher or discipline.

Article in a newspaper or popular magazine

Newspaper and magazine articles may be cited in running text ("As Kuldip Singh noted in a *The Indian Express* article on April 11, 2025, . . ."), and they are commonly omitted from a reference list. The following examples show the more formal versions of the citations. If you consulted the article online, include a URL; include an access date only if your publisher or discipline requires one. If no author is identified, begin the citation with the article title.

Website

A citation to website content can often be limited to a mention in the text ("As of July 19, 2008, the McDonald"s Corporation listed on its website . . ."). If a more formal citation is desired, it may be styled as in the examples below. Because such content is subject to change, include an access date or, if available, a date that the site was last modified. In the absence of a date of publication, use the access date or last-modified date as the basis of the citation.

Blog entry or comment

Blog entries or comments may be cited in running text ("In a comment posted to *The Becker-Posner Blog* on February 23, 2010, . . ."), and they are commonly omitted from a reference list. If a reference list entry is needed, cite the blog post there but mention comments in the text only. (If an access date is required, add it before the URL; see examples elsewhere in this guide.)

E-mail or text message

E-mail and text messages may be cited in running text ("In a text message to the author on March 1, 2010, John Doe revealed . . ."), and they are rarely listed in a reference list. In parenthetical citations, the term *personal communication* (or *pers. comm.*) can be used.

(John Doe, e-mail message to author, February 28, 2010) or (John Doe, pers. comm.)

Item in a commercial database

For items retrieved from a commercial database, add the name of the database and an accession number following the facts of publication. In this example, the dissertation cited above is shown as it would be cited if it were retrieved from ProQuest's database for dissertations and theses.
