# TWO-DAY NATIONAL WEBINAR- TRANSFORMATIVE REFORMS IN NEP 2020: PRESENT INITIATIVES AND ROAD AHEAD

#### DATE: 31 AUGUST- 1 SEPTEMBER 2021

The School of Education, Faculty of Education, Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi, conducted a two-day online national conference to mark the first anniversary of NEP-2020 from August 31, 2021, to September 1, 2021. Under the auspices of the Government of India's Pandit Madan Mohan Malviya National Mission on Teachers and Training (PMMMNMTT) programme, the SOE conducted the webinar (GOI). The conference's co-convener, Dr. Savita Kaushal, gave a brief introduction before the commencement of the inaugural session. The panelists of the webinar were Prof. R. P. Tiwari, the Vice Chancellor of Central University of Punjab; Prof. Ram Shankar Kureel, former Vice Chancellor of Babasaheb Bhimrao Ambedkar University; Prof. Sanjeev Kumar Sharma, Vice Chancellor of Mahatma Gandhi Central University, Bihar and Prof. Tankeshwar Kumar Vice Chancellor of Central University of Haryana. The Webinar started with an overwhelming response of the participants as well as the invited speakers. It informed about the importance of Education as it is one of the fundamental factors for development of any nation.

Without significant investments in human capital, no nation can have sustainable economic growth. Education raises standard of living and has a stronger positive social impact on both individuals and societies. Education not only ensures wealth distribution and economic and social progress, but it also boosts productivity and creativity, encouraging entrepreneurship and technical advancements. High quality education, or education on par with world-class education, may be the greatest path forward for developing and harnessing the nation's rich talent. NEP, 2020 was discussed by the invited speakers, who focused on its numerous features. The Government of India's New Educational Policy envisions an educational system rooted in Indian ethos that can lead India on the path to becoming a global knowledge super-power by developing an equitable and vibrant knowledge society as a way forward to address the issues of the present and to meet the evolving needs of the new learning age. The Policy envisions a curriculum and pedagogy that can aid in cultivating in students a profound respect for constitutional values and basic obligations as well as a conscious understanding of one's roles and responsibilities in a changing world. In order to prepare Indian youth for a responsible commitment to human rights, sustainable development, global wellbeing, and becoming truly global citizens, the strategy places an emphasis on the holistic development of Indian youth. The Policy emphasises skill development as the essential component for transforming India into an independent nation.

# TWO-DAY NATIONAL WEBINAR- TRANSFORMATIVE REFORMS IN NEP 2020: PRESENT INITIATIVES AND ROAD AHEAD

DATE: 31 AUGUST- 1 SEPTEMBER 2021

The National Education Policy 2020 emphasises digital education coupled with the freedom to select disciplines, allowing students to choose the proper educational path and obtain the necessary skills. The policy places emphasis on vocational training and education and calls for the gradual integration of vocational education into mainstream educational institutions in order to create self-sufficient citizen in all spheres of life. Secondary schools will work together with local businesses, ITIs, and polytechnics to advance these goals. Schools will also set up skill labs. The discussion continued regarding professional education, which NEP2020 states should be a component of the higher education system.

In order to help India become self-sufficient, stand-alone universities in the fields of agriculture, law, and medicine can be transformed into multidisciplinary learning environments. It has been advised that students should be able to select courses from across the curriculum, such as science and music or history and physics, for the all-around development of the students. NEP 2020 suggests changes to the teacher education system in order to improve teachers' motivation and guarantee that the nation's children have access to the efficient teachers, pointing out the crucial role that teachers play in the teaching and learning process. Speaking of cultivating research mindset, Prof. Shukla claims that NEP 2020 presents a landmark project because it pares the way for the founding of National Research Foundation and provide direction of a research culture that permeates Indian universities. The panel discussion that followed, which all of the panelists as well as invited speakers. It focused on the main aspects of NEP, 2020, and its future.




#### **RESEARCH PROPOSALS' PRESENTATION**


**DATE: 20-25 JANUARY 2022** 

Of the significant annual events of the department, the presentation of research and project proposals by M.Ed, M.A. (EPA) and PGDEM students is one of them. The third-semester students of M.Ed and M.A. (EPA) programmes are required to choose a research problem and draft a research proposal under the supervision of a designated faculty member.

Students learn about the process of conducting a research while taking into account all the ethical considerations, creating schemas connected to various notions of research, and explore their research-related abilities through this practicum. Owing to the fact that the university was closed because of pandemic, students submitted their research proposals online during the week-long research proposal presentation activity.

Everyone from teaching the staff and students attended the presentation. The main goal of the presentation activity was to strengthen research proposals' title, research questions, research objectives, need of the study, and methodology. Since each student in the department received insightful feedback, attention is now on improving their research skills.







## VISIT TO NATIONAL MUSEUM: AN ATTEMPT TOWARDS CRITICAL PEDAGOGY

DATE: 13 NOVEMBER 2021

The Ph.D. scholars were invited for an excursion to National Museum on 13 November 2021 as a part of coursework under the guidance of Dr. Harpreet Kaur Jass, Assistant Professor. The National Museum, New Delhi, was inaugurated by Shri R.C. Rajagopalachari, the Governor-General of India in 1949. Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, the Prime Minister of India, laid its foundation in 1955. The Museum holds approximately 2,00,000 objects of diverse nature. The artefacts are both Indian as well as foreign, and it covers a time span of over five thousand years from Indian cultural heritage.

The National Museum was declared as a separate institution by the Ministry of Education and placed it under its direct control opposed to how it initially was looked after by the Director General of Archaeology until 1957. At present, the National Museum is under the administrative control of the Ministry of Culture, Government of India.

The excursion revolved around critical pedagogy and reflection while linking it with education. Scholars were asked to choose one gallery and observe it while noting down key points that strike the inquisitive minds.

After visiting the gallery, reflection session was led by Dr. Harpreet Kaur Jass in which all the scholars participated. Scholars stood forming a circle, while the moderator took her place in the centre.

Few questions were asked thereon to facilitate and navigate through critical reflection such as;

- Express your experience.
- What is the one word that comes to your mind after visiting the gallery?
- What fascinates you more in the gallery?
- What are the things that are still in existence?


The discussion furthered engaged scholars with reflection and critical analysis with endnote from Dr. Harpreet Kaur Jass thus stringing all pieces together.

# RESEARCH COLLOQUIUM: DOMINANT PEDAGOGY IN TEACHERS' EDUCATION INSTITUTE: CULTURE OF KEY BOOKS

DATE: 25 NOVEMBER 2021

As the invited speaker, Dr. Ajay Kumar Singh, Associate Professor IGNOU, New Delhi shared his work titled 'Dominant Pedagogy in Teachers Education Institute: Culture of Key Books'. The event was held on 25 November 2021 and attended by a number of Ph.D. and M.Ed scholars as well as faculty from DES. Dr. Ajay noted in his speech that teacher training institutions have been using key texts for over 70 years and that they have a sizable market share in India. He conducted his research by visiting teacher-training facilities and rural places, and he discovered that both teachers and students relied on reference or supplemental texts to understand and replicate important educational concepts in exams. He shed light on NCTE's role in streamlining teacher training in India. NCTE issued recommendations about teacher education curriculum after 2009. He added that though the National Teacher Education Framework is a significant document, in certain instances, it does not align with the laws that were passed at the time, like the Right to Education Act (RTE).

Significantly, the concept of a single teacher and classroom is mentioned in NCF 2005, RTE 2009, and associated policy documents. To guarantee that everyone has equitable access to education, there is an urgent need for more qualified/trained teachers.





Since there were already too few qualified candidates for teacher education, the: "key culture" grew to meet these urgent demands. Supplemental books were first used by teacher educators and student teachers to pass exams. The engagement session started after Dr. Ajay's talk, which lasted for 40-45 minutes. A professor at the host school equated Krishna Kumar's culture in the textbook to the existence of a "key culture." He emphasised that the "key culture" has roots in all dimensions and levels of the Indian educational system, not just teacher education. The contradiction between rising teacher education standards and how professionals are being formed as well as the discrepancy between the curriculum and the training that learners receive were other questions raised by listeners. This idea needs to be modified in teacher education institutions, especially those that adhere to a "key culture," as was stressed in the discussion about how crucial content may let students ask teachers any question and expect them to engage in a dialogue.

In charge of the Colloquium, Dr. Sajjad Ahmad, gave a vote of thanks at the end of the meeting.

# RESEARCH COLLOQUIUM: CHANGING FACE OF EDUCATION DURING AND AFTER PANDEMIC

DATE: 23 DECEMBER 2021

The Research Colloquium was virtually held by DES on December 23, 2021, from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM. Dr. Sanjeev Rai, an educationist was the invited speaker. He spoke on topic 'Changing Face of Education During and After Pandemic'. Faculty as well as many Ph.D. and M.Ed students from DES attended the event.

He discussed how the epidemic affected people's lives. Education was not exempted from this crisis either. As a result of this crisis process has been interfered. Reopening of the universities is largely health administrator's decision, and falls out of the domain of education sector.

Both teachers and students have expressed concern about the uncertainities related to education. Accessibility issues, parental issues, and how they contribute to domestic disputes were also discussed between the resource person and audience. In addition, he noted additional short term and long term obstacles that universities may encounter. He listed the issues as a rapid shift in the role of teachers, internet addiction, digital and learning divide, quality gap, and the influence of new Edu-Tech companies.

To conclude, participants and the resource person engaged in a lengthy conversation that shed light on the current changes in the educational fields as a result of the epidemic.




DATE: 22 DECEMBER 2021

Technology allows them to acquire foreign knowledge in their own language and transmit their knowledge to others. Professor G.D. Sharma thanked Shree Harshad P. Shah for his valuable comments on the various aspects of future learning and intended changes. With this he invited Professor S.R. Bhatt to ponder upon the topic and on the session.

#### ABSTRACT

The present study investigated the efficacy of metalinguistic awareness instruction for enhan reading comprehension of primary school students. The objectives of the study were : 1) To compare the effectiveness of metalinguistic awareness instruction with traditional instruction in rms of reading comprehension mean scores of primary school students and 2) To analyze the efficacy of metalingusitic awareness instruction in enhancing reading comprehension of primary school students. In order to estimate the efficacy of metalinguistic awareness instruction a comparison between Metalinguistic awareness instruction and traditional instruction was made using a mixed method pre-test, post-test quasi experimental research design. The difference between the means of pre and post-tests (i.e. mean gain score) were tested for statistical significance. The sample of the study consisted of 114 students of class 5th studying in two different schools. Selection of classes to form the experimental and control group was done through random sampling. The data collection was done using the following tools developed by the researcher for the present study:

- · A Reading ability test to ensure that the participants have basic word decoding skills necessary for the treatment.
- · Two forms of Metalinguistic knowledge and awareness test as well as reading comprehension test to be used as pre and post-tests.
- · A metalinguistic awareness instruction plan covering the syntactic, morphological and

Another chief guest Mr. Zeeshan Zamir stole the event by presenting a gazal/ nazam.



#### **Debate Competition**




